

Upcoming Council meetings are scheduled for March 1 at 9 am and March 15 at 7 pm in the Howick Council chambers at the municipal office.

The **2022 interim tax bills** have been mailed out. If you have not received your bill, please contact the office. Your interim bill calculation is based on 50% of your 2021 final billing. The due dates are March 25th and May 27th.

**2022 dog licences** are due. If you have a dog and no tags or licence, please contact the municipal office. If an owner fails to purchase dog licence for current year, the set fine is \$100.

**Poop & Scoop** - dog owners and walkers are responsible for picking up after their pet. Please carry a bag when with your dog off your property. Owners who fail to pick up their dog excrement may be fined \$200.00.

Remember to test your well water! With heavy rains in springtime, the Huron County Health Unit and the Township of Howick want to remind residents to test their well water. Free bottles can be picked up at the Howick municipal office but not dropped off. Palmerston, Wingham or Listowel Hospitals are some of the local drop off locations.


Role of Municipal Government - Canada has one national government, ten provincial governments and three territorial governments and thousands of local governments. There are 444 municipalities in Ontario, ranging in size from large urban centres to rural townships. Each municipal government acts like a company with the power to make certain decisions for the people within its own geographic area but must also follow the rules set for them by the Ontario government.

Along with its defined geographic area and the powers assigned by the Ontario government, municipalities have two other key features – the power to tax and an elected council.

Howick Township also has appointed Municipal Service Boards/Committees to provide administrative services relative to the operation, care and maintenance of municipally owned properties such as community halls, parks and cemeteries. Village Boards of Management are appointed in the Villages of Fordwich, Gorrie and Wroxeter to administer requisite services specific to their respective Villages.

### **PUBLIC WORKS & RECREATION**

WINTER RULES: As winter is now well under way Public Works Staff would like to remind residents that overnight parking is not permitted and pushing snow across the roadway or depositing it on the road is prohibited under the Highway Traffic Act. The following is an excerpt taken directly from the Highway Traffic Act:

#### Deposit of snow on roadway:

181 No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing so to do from the Ministry or the road authority responsible for the maintenance of the road. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 181.

#### General penalty:

214 (1) Every person who contravenes this Act or any regulation is guilty of an offence and on conviction, where a penalty for the contravention is not otherwise provided for herein, is liable to a fine of not less than \$60 and not more than \$1,000. 2017, c. 26, Sched. 4, s. 26.

**Waste receptacles** should be placed in a way that does not interfere with snow clearing and mail delivery.

**THE LANDFILL** is on winter hours starting November 1, 2021, Wednesday 9 am – 4 pm and Saturday 9am – 1pm; these hours will remain in effect until May 1, 2022.

**BAG TAG PRICE** increased from \$2.50 per tag to \$2.75 per tag starting January 1, 2022.

#### TOWNSHIP OF HOWICK IS CHANGING THE WAY BURN PERMITS ARE ISSUED



Beginning January 1 2022, all open air burning in Howick Township requires a permit. A burn permit will be required annually for all open air burning, including recreational (camp) fires and rural open air burning. **The cost of a permit is \$50.00** and is valid for the property registered. If you own multiple properties where burning may take place, they can be registered on the same permit.

This single point registration will be kept on file and will eliminate the need to call in prior to each burning. You will also be provided with a copy of the Howick Township Open Air Burning By-Law for reference.

Remember YOU are responsible for your burning and costs associated with any fire department response to illegal open air burning.

Permits must be filed and payment made at the municipal office, 44816 Harriston Road, RR1 Gorrie.



The article below was printed in the late '40's. At that time, the Fordwich Telephone office was located above the store that was situated across from Bare Necessities. The telephone office was only accessible through a stair and door to the east of the building. When ice floes above the dam broke loose, the dam failed to hold it back. Water rose up to the building and Lois Hambly (Simmons), who was manning the switchboard that evening, could not exit the building. The building later included a pool room, barber shop, and a variety store in the west end. Until the "new" bridge was built, the old iron bridge that connected the 6th Concession (Gough Line) was the only access to the southern part of Fordwich. Later, a new telephone office was built on higher ground. The building, a white house on the curve to the new bridge, has since been converted to a home.

Thank you to Wilda Ruttan, who helped Marion to piece together the information. Her husband, Anson Ruttan and Ken Graham owned the Purina Feed Mill, on the west side of the dam.






# Mailland Valley CAMERA CLUB



Pauline became a director of the London and Ontario Horticultural Societies and a lifetime member of the Western Fair Association, which in 2011 named her Volunteer of the Year. "Growing for Showing" was her motto and every fall she judged fairs and flower shows across Ontario. She also worked with the Ministry of Agriculture to establish a school to train judges for the province's many fall fairs, work she continued after she and George retired to Fordwich in 1982. Pauline belonged to the Women's Institute and was a lifelong member of the Fordwich United Church and UCW. She served as treasurer for the congregation, participated in UCW studies and devotions, provided floral displays every Sunday, and sang in the choir. She was an artist who loved painting, gardening, flower and display arranging, and quilting. For years she "marked" the quilts for her quilting group who sometimes met in the activity room of the Fordwich Village Nursing Home. In 2015 the wonderful staff there welcomed Pauline as a resident. 


